Quality Summit Urinary Catheter Care

Delivery Partners: The improvement team collaborated with QI colleagues at GHFT to support the hospital's Deputy Director of infection Prevention and Control to convene colleagues.

Situation:

A recent investigation recommended a thematic analysis of catheter care/management. The analysis identified a number of issues, with a quality summit determined as the best way of identifying, prioritising and progressing the requisite improvement, whilst engaging staff knowledge and expertise in exploring the existing processes and contributing to improvement.

Enabling Assignment:

The improvement team were approached to support the Quality Summit for Urinary Catheter Care as it was identified that the issues would require a cross-system approach and a coordinated collaboration involving ICB, Acute, Community and Primary Care colleagues would be advantageous. The summit was designed by GHT colleagues but delivered/facilitated in partnership with the ICB and GHC colleagues.

This event gave use the opportunity to work with less familiar tools such as SEIPS, as well as lending our expertise in areas such as process mapping. The Summit resulted in a clear set of priorities and the setting up of working groups.

We then supported delivery of the GSQIA Silver modules so support these groups to design/develop their improvement projects.
